BISHOP'S CHRISTMAS MESSAGE 2022

To all Clergy, Episcopalians and Friends:

We bless God for another Season of Christmas. Many in Liberia and around the world find it difficult to celebrate it. The year 2022 has been a year of pain and sufferings of different kinds: bereavement, loss of jobs and other good things in their lives, experience of physical violence: domestic, sexual, racism, tribalism, ethnic, natural disasters, wars, rejection, and oppression of all sorts. These painful and unpleasant experiences have been perpetuated by individuals, groups and nations. Through it all, as Christians, we can say with the Psalmist, "Truly, the Lord is good to Israel" (Psalm 72:1). In spite of these challenges and painful experiences, we say the Lord has been good to us. He has preserved our lives up to current for a purpose.

Christmas is a reminder of God's love for the human race. It is a reminder about God's greatest gift, the gift of His very best, His one and only Son, Jesus Christ. He came to and continues to offer Himself as the Solution to the human condition of sin and its devastating effects on all mankind. He came to demonstrate God's love, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16).
